

Hello Church Family!

As Lenten Season comes to a close, we look forward to celebrating the most significant events in the history of the world! But, what do we *call* the day Jesus was raised?

The English monk of the $7^{th}/8^{th}$ cents., Bede, states that the month of April was called "Eostre" because where he lived there was a goddess of the same name. It's unclear if there really was a goddess by that name,

but the name, "Easter," almost certainly derives from this old English term, "Eostre," which correlates to Spring/April. This is probably why flowers, bunnies, and eggs were introduced into the season (which have nothing to do with Jesus's resurrection, of course). Nevertheless, for many, the day Jesus was raised is called, "Easter."

But, for centuries before this, Christians didn't call this special day, "Easter." And, for close to a billion Christians today, it's still not called, "Easter." Here's why. The Jewish Passover feast moves around on the calendar because it follows the moon's cycles. And since we know that Jesus's last meal with His disciples was associated with the Passover, (most) ancient Christians celebrated Jesus's resurrection three days after the Passover feast, wherever that date fell each year. Most Christians for centuries spoke Greek and/or Latin. They called the day Jesus was raised, "*Pascha*" (from the Aramaic and Hebrew, "*Pesach*," for our word, "Passover"). The other title commonly used was "Resurrection Sunday." These two titles are still used by a huge portion of Christians around the world: *Pascha* or *Resurrection Sunday*.

If we didn't follow the lunar calendar, but just celebrated Jesus's death and resurrection on a fixed day, when would it be? Scholars are divided, but for various historical reasons, Jesus's death probably occurred around 3pm on Friday, April 3, 33. This would put His resurrection around Sunday, April 5, 33.

Most importantly, why celebrate Jesus's death and resurrection? What's the significance?

Jesus's death *did* something. He wasn't just a good example for us to follow; His death wasn't just a symbol. Not only did Jesus's death demonstrate an unfathomable love for us (Rom. 5:8; Eph. 5:2; 1 John 3:16), His death also condemned sin (Rom. 8:3), defeated death itself (2 Tim. 1:10), allowed us to be declared righteous (Rom. 5:9), allowed us to be reconciled with the Father (Rom. 5:10), gave us the ability to be raised to new life (1 Thess. 5:10), and ransomed us, redeemed us, set us free, from the power of evil and sin (Mark 10:45; Gal. 3:13-14; 1 Tim. 2:6; 1 Pet. 1:18-19). When Jesus died, it

affected all of history and humanity. And all of us who have repented of our sins and reoriented our lives in Him are part of His new family, set free to live the lives He intended.

Jesus's resurrection *did* something. Not only did Jesus's resurrection demonstrate that the Father vindicated Jesus (e.g., Acts 2:24; 3:15), but His resurrection also defeated death (Rom. 6:9), allows us to live a "new life" (Rom. 6:4; 8:11)—as if we're reigning right now in the heavenly realms (Eph. 2:6; Col. 2:12; 3:1), makes us righteous/justified before the Father (Rom. 4:25), and guarantees that we, too, will be raised in a resurrection body (1 Cor. 6: 14; 2 Cor. 4:14).

Jesus's death and resurrection are the absolute center of the Christian faith. There is nothing more central. There is nothing more necessary. There is nothing more urgent to share.

I really hope that you'll commit to being a part of this special season of the church! Two significant events take place on Good Friday, April 14th, at First Christian. On that Friday, anyone can sign-up in the Fellowship Hall to pray in 30-min segments, from 6am to 6pm, especially in the sanctuary. Then, at 6pm, you'll want to come celebrate Good Friday service. Two days later, at the Clinton Lake Gazebo, we'll have a spectacular Sunrise Service at 6am (See <u>Facebook Events</u> for more info.). At FCC, we'll have our Traditional Service at 9am, a free breakfast at 10am in the Fellowship Hall, and our Modern Service at 11am.

Who are you inviting to church? I cannot stress the importance of a personal invitation. It's still one of the most effective ways of introducing Christianity, or a local church, to someone. Yes, the person might say, "No, thank you." But, the person might say, "Sure, when is the service?" You don't know if you don't ask. Please commit to asking your neighbors, co-workers, family members, and friends.

MISSIONARY NEWS



Dear wonderful supporters,

Yes, you have faithfully supported us and prayed for us these last 5 months with very little communication from us. THANK YOU, thank you, thank you...for monthly, quarterly, annual, and special Christmas gifts that have all made it to our bank accounts. Even though you haven't received an official thank you note, you do have our heart-felt gratitude.

Why the silence, you may ask? Well, in short, it had to do with holiday activities followed by

Branch Conference, 3 weeks of workshops, and 2 weeks with a TechServe team, followed by catching up on numerous piles of tasks that were largely neglected since October. By early February, Ed and I were both experiencing signs of burnout, fatigue, sickness, forgetfulness, grumpiness, etc. Our silence often means we are too overwhelmed to communicate. Some of you wisely wrote expressing your concern and commitment to pray for us. What a blessing to know people were praying!

In spite of our personal inadequacies, God has been at work in Mexico. You will get a printed newsletter into your mailbox soon explaining more about that. However, the main purpose of this email is to inform you about some urgent needs we have as we prepare for furlough. Our plan is to arrive in Illinois in early July, celebrate Rachel's wedding in August, followed by some much needed R&R time before we return to Mexico in early January.

Furlough Needs:

<u>A U.S. vehicle</u>: By June, we will have saved about \$5000. If you would like to contribute to the vehicle fund, let us know. We plan to buy an extended cab truck we can afford based on what we have saved by early June.

- <u>Financial support:</u> Our support has dropped a little in recent months. We are now receiving about 92% of our ministry budget. If you are a regular supporter, would you prayerfully consider increasing your giving by at least 8%? Once on furlough, Wycliffe won't let us return to Mexico without a full 100%. If we reach that goal now, we won't have to bring this subject up again.
- <u>Megan's needs</u>: Some of you have also been a part of Megan's support team with ELIC in Asia. If you are helping her, you are also helping us. She has an \$8000 deficit that she needs to raise before the end of July. At that time she will return to the U.S., find a job, buy a car, etc. She plans to move in with us, share our vehicle and adjust to U.S. culture after 2 years of living in Asia.
- <u>Logistics:</u> In the book, *Serving as Senders*, by Neal Pirolo, he encourages the support team back home to value their role as senders. Beyond financial support, there are so many ways you can help us. Things that are hard to deal with upon our return from furlough, besides acquiring a vehicle, include:
 - o <u>Furlough Housing</u>: Praise God, a dear Christian brother has once again offered a farmhouse where we plan to stay through December. However, we will need to find another place to stay during our last month of furlough.
 - o <u>June job, housing & transportation for Ryan</u>: Ryan hopes to be part of the summer crew working with a seed corn company in Illinois. Since the farmhouse is not available until July, he needs help. He will consider another job offer.
 - o <u>Wedding Plans</u>: Praise God again, a dear Christian sister is helping Rachel with her wedding plans. Rachel plans to have the ceremony at our Illinois church with a reception at the farm. However, she could use more help with logistics. If anyone living near Walnut can help, let us know. It's hard to do all the planning long distance, especially on a minimal budget.

<u>Encouragement, prayer and godly counsel</u>: Above all, we do not discount how VERY important your prayers and words of wisdom will help us as we make furlough plans and recover from burnout. We look forward to rich times together praising God in worship, studying His Word together, sharing about God's work in Mexico, enjoying precious moments with family, and reigniting friendships.

Thank you, again, for standing with us as we persevere to bring God's message to the people of Mexico.
