#### FIRST CHRISTIAN CHURCH



Hey Church Family!

It's Resurrection Seasons! Jesus's death and resurrection are the absolute center of the Christian faith. There is nothing more central. There is nothing more necessary. There is nothing more urgent to share. Why celebrate Jesus's death and resurrection? What's the big deal?

**Jesus's death did something**. He wasn't just a good example for us to follow; His death wasn't just a symbol. Not only did Jesus's death demonstrate an unfathomable love for us (Rom. 5:8; Eph. 5:2; 1 John 3:16), His death also condemned sin (Rom. 8:3), defeated death itself (2 Tim. 1:10), allowed us to be declared righteous (Rom. 5:9), allowed us to be reconciled with the Father (Rom. 5:10), gave us the ability to be raised to new life (1 Thess. 5:10), and ransomed us,

redeemed us, set us free, from the power of evil and sin (Mark 10:45; Gal. 3:13-14; 1 Tim. 2:6; 1 Pet. 1:18-19). When Jesus died, it affected all of history and humanity. And all of us who have repented of our sins and reoriented our lives in Him are part of His new family, set free to live the lives He intended.

Jesus's resurrection did something. Not only did Jesus's resurrection demonstrate that the Father vindicated Jesus (e.g., Acts 2:24; 3:15), but His resurrection also defeated death (Rom. 6:9), allows us to live a "new life" (Rom. 6:4; 8:11)—as if we're reigning right now in the heavenly realms (Eph. 2:6; Col. 2:12; 3:1), makes us righteous/justified before the Father (Rom. 4:25), and guarantees that we, too, will be raised in a resurrection body (1 Cor. 6: 14; 2 Cor. 4:14).

Non-Christians are right to ask, "Why do you believe Jesus was raised from the dead?" When I answer that question, I focus on key facts that hold one thing in common: a profound, unheard-of change in theology and praxis for multiple Jews (even His enemies!), within years of the event. For example:

- 1. Saul/Paul was an adamant opponent of Jewish Messianists and had the job of arresting them (Acts 8:3; Gal. 1:23). He almost certainly never met Jesus, and was certainly no friend to His followers! Then he absolutely changed sides (on the issue of Jesus, of course, not on the issue of being an ethnic Jew) and went around, in the face of profound persecution on all sides, telling everyone that Jesus was resurrected and the living Lord. I think the resurrection best explains his "conversion experience," theology, mission, message, and hope.
- 2. It's crucial to remember the ancient context. There were numerous purported messiah-figures and prophets near Jesus's life (Messiah figures: = Judas of Sepphoris (4 BC), Simon of Perea (4 BC), Athronges (4-2 BC), Menahem (AD 66), John of Gischala (AD 67-70), Simon bar Giora of Gerasa (AD 68-70), Lukuas of Cyrene (AD 115), Simon ben Kosiba/Bar Kochba (AD 132-135); "Prophets": John the Baptizer (AD 20s), The "Samaritan" (AD 26-36), Theudas (AD 45), The "Egyptian" Jew (AD 56), An anonymous "imposter" (AD 61), Jesus son of Ananias (AD 62-69), Jonathan the Weaver, refugee of Cyrene (AD 71).) After one of these leaders would die, their followers might do either of two things: (a) disband, because their leader was a failure; or (b) declare that God's Spirit had now rested on another person in the movement, especially a relative (like the eldest brother). What they most certainly did *not* do was to claim that the dead leader had been vindicated by God, giving him a new, transformed, Spirit-infused body after he died. *Jens didn't do things like that. Ever.* Yet, that's *precisely* what the earliest Jesus movement claimed. They didn't disband. They didn't claim that James, Jesus's brother, was the new Messiah. No. From within decades (at the latest) the earliest Jesus followers were writing songs to Jesus as living Lord, praying to Him, healing people in His "name," baptizing in His "name," celebrating His death at atoning/saving, and preaching boldly in His "name." I think the resurrection best explains why the earliest Jewish Christians talked, acted, and thought as if Jesus were alive and well, present with them, and governing the events of history as Ruler with God the Father.
- 3. Related to #2 is the fact that doing all those things in the "name" of Jesus implied profound theological facts about Jesus. Whether hymns written to Jesus as God/Lord (spread throughout NT) or rewriting the Shema (1 Cor 8:6), these Jews deliberately included Jesus into the divine identity--and this kind of thing had never been done before in the history of Judaism. I think the resurrection best explains why they would include Jesus in the divine identity.
- 4. Every text which speaks of Jesus appearing to His disciples demonstrates that not one single disciple believed, without evidence, that Jesus (a) *would be* raised and/or that He (b) *was* actually raised. It's amazing to me that not one disciple was looking for it. So, in addition to Paul/Saul (though I think this category is different because they knew Jesus), they, too, must be convinced. I think the resurrection best explains why they all changed their minds.

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5. It's shocking to me that such widespread belief in the resurrection occurred so early and was so widespread (i.e., it occurs in multiple different documents and strands of traditions). If this were a later legend, shouldn't it take, at minimum, a couple decades? 1 Cor 15:3ff, written within twenty years of Jesus's life, speaks of the "tradition handed down" that Jesus was killed and raised on the third day, in language that was technical within Jewish circles. Remember, the Gospels and Paul's letters were all composed within the life-times of the original eye-witnesses, who could easily refute false information. I think the resurrection best explains why the changes happen so fast and are so widespread.



- 6. New Testament scholar, N.T. Wright, is correct: When Jews spoke of resurrection, it was (a) a peripheral topic, not central to any Jewish belief, praxis, or literature; (b) would occur to a group of people (all Jews or faithful Jews or whatever); and (c) would occur at the shift of the ages, at Judgment Day. (A fourth commonality might include the typical belief that resurrection would include the FORMER body of the person.) However, the earliest Jewish Christians differed on all these points: they (a) made resurrection central to their belief and praxis; (b) constantly and consistently said it happened only to one person (at this point in history) and; (c) happened in this era, not (only) at the shift of the ages/Day of YHWH. (And of course, the NT presents Jesus as having a new body of the new age). I think the resurrection best explains these changes in belief.
- 7. Other anecdotal things like the fact that priests and Pharisees are even converted (in Acts 15 it mentions them in passing). I think the resurrection best explains why the very people who helped get Jesus arrested and killed are now part of the community of people praying to Jesus, singing to Jesus, preaching about a resurrected Jesus, etc.

If we celebrated Jesus's death and resurrection on a fixed day, when would it be? Scholars are divided, but for various historical reasons, Jesus's death probably occurred around 3pm on Friday, April 3, 33. This would put His resurrection around Sunday, April 5, 33.

I really hope that you'll commit to being a part of this special season of the church! In the love of the One "who gave himself for our sins to rescue us from this present evil age according to the will of our God and Father, to whom be glory forever and ever! Amen." (Gal. 1:4-5 NET)

### OUTREACH MINISTRIES

Greetings in Christ Jesus!

Have you ever wanted to share your faith with others, but then not know where to start or what to say? I certainly have! And as I talk to others, it seems to be a trend among some of us who profess Christ. Actually, I just read of an interesting study today. On the website for the Billy Graham Center of Wheaton College, they share: "Research tells us that nearly 80% of unchurched people said they would engage in a faith conversation if their Christian friends asked. Unfortunately, only 39% of Christians have actually shared how to become a Christian with someone in the past six months."

That was striking to me! I do not mean any guilt by that, nor do you have to be fearful of having to clearly explain how someone enters the Kingdom of God and lead them to Christ in each conversation. But we can all practice engaging with people on various levels regarding matters of faith, and how Jesus changes our lives. May the Spirit grant us courage and boldness to invite people to the Kingdom. As we take steps towards conversations of Jesus, and enter into them, let's rejoice and cheer one another on for making an effort!

I would love to encourage you to reflect on your conversations with people regarding faith. Here are a few ideas I have found helpful to take a step to conversations about Jesus with others:

- Be a learner of people, ask them questions, and from their answers ask more non-intrusive questions. As they share, there may be felt needs arise through which you can share an aspect about the God of the universe that can meet those needs.
- As one man working in India put it, always have fresh rotti! (Rotti is Indian flat bread) Who wants stale bread? It's harder to share stale bread with people. People want fresh bread, and we are more eager to share something we are currently enjoying. Jesus is the bread of life. Enter the Bible daily. Consider what you are reading. Rather than just glossing over text, consider things that strike you... do you paint a picture in your mind, are you convicted of how to live life, are you excited about a new insight? And then you can honestly share "I had an interesting (or challenging/convicting/encouraging/etc) time reading this morning." They may ask more, and you can share just a bit. If they are interested, a dialogue may arise.
- Practice talking about Jesus to yourself or with other believers. Consider, what difference does Jesus make in your life?
- Practice saying Jesus's name out loud! Declaring Jesus is good.
- Encourage one another in talking about Jesus with others, and ask how others are doing.
- Pray, asking God to give opportunity for conversations to come up in which you can talk about Jesus.

Please, share with me what you have found helpful in talking about Jesus as well. We can all grow together in delighting in, and sharing our Treasure, King Jesus, with others!


#### STEWARDSHIP

There are so many wonderful things happening here at First Christian. As we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, it reminds us of new beginnings. As the spring season slowly comes about, we see new growth in the vegetation around us. The trees and flowers are beginning to bloom. God has given us such beauty in our world. We are also seeing new growth here at FCC. We have had 3 recent baptisms, new Christians starting their new life in Christ. The love and knowledge of the life that God has is in store is just starting to bloom. There is so much beauty in seeing a new Christian experience God's love for them. We are thankful for ministries that allow new Christians to learn and to grow. We are thankful for a ministry staff that is well education and ready to teach and to counsel. We are thankful to all who give to make these ministries possible.

Because you give, we are also able to provide a place for people to come who are hurting and lost, a place to learn more about God and his incredible love for us, a place where God can use people to change lives! With your gifts and time we are able to provide food through LINK and household items through the Helping Hands closet. Because you give, we can maintain a wonderful facility for children to attend preschool, for those new Christians to be baptized, for bible studies, for recovery groups to meet, for couples to get married, for families to dedicate new babies and for families to say goodbye to their loved ones who have been called home. We are so thankful, because of so many, we can continue to minister and to be a place and a people that God can use to change lives! The Trustees are excited about 2018. The church is growing and sometimes it takes a little time for the finances to catch up. As we have mentioned in previous monthly newsletters, we are lacking in what we need to support our budget for 2018. Based on pledges, loose offering, and non-pledged funds we are at about 70% of what is needed. To keep the congregation informed, we will be including the chart below each month to show our average income needed compared to our monthly offerings.

#### Please note the following:

- On average we need \$9,204 per Sunday to cover our budgetary needs.
- Some months have 5 Sundays, the graph will indicate those months with an increase in the budget number.
- Larger one-time gifts or early annual payments of pledges we be spread over the remaining months.
- These numbers represent what is given to the Unified Budget for our operating, missions and outreach budget. It does not include gifts for the building, capital improvements or other designated gifts.
- March numbers are preliminary, any change should be minimal. The Trustees will meet later this month to approve the March statements.

We were about 20% behind where we needed to be for February and 40% behind for March. At this rate, on average, we will be behind roughly \$116,000 at year end. If you haven't pledged, please consider doing so. If you could consider an additional gift for 2018, it would be very much appreciated. The Trustees are keeping a close eye on the finances and will keep you further updated through the newsletter and bulletins. Monthly giving will fluctuate from month to month, some of the fluctuation is related to the timing of gifts. If someone is on vacation or misses a Sunday, their gift may fall into the next month. To avoid this, might we suggest setting up recurring payments through our online giving option. Just go to our website and click the "Give" button. We recommend the ACH option as the fees are much less, than using a credit card. If you have questions or need help, please contact Lisa in the Finance Office.


