Hey Church Family,

As many of you know, a precious family at FCC suffered a terrible tragedy recently when their young son died suddenly. They need our constant prayers and support.

We know that Jesus loved children. One time, parents were bringing their children to Jesus so that Jesus might lay His hands on them and pray for them. Jesus's disciples fussed at those parents. Children shouldn't have such access to a respected Jewish teacher. In a society where children held no authority whatsoever (in fact considered just above slaves), Jesus used children as a great example of how His disciples should be. "But Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me and do not try to stop them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such

as these."" (Matt. 19:14 NET) That is, it's not that proper faith in Jesus is *childish*, but "like a child" – i.e., it approaches Jesus with no entitlement, no claim to social status, or "chip on your shoulder." Instead, you just trust. You come with open hands.

This is still true. Millions and millions of children are alive and well with our Lord, Jesus, right now. Children of all races. Children of all backgrounds. And *they're completely welcome to play and grow in the presence of Jesus*. The "kingdom of Heaven" is *made* for such people.

But what about us who are left behind? We grieve. Grief is the necessary response to such terrible loss. And in our grief, we do "not grieve like the rest who have no hope." (1 Thess. 4:13 NET) We have a genuine hope, based on Jesus's teaching and death and resurrection, that all of our loved ones—children and Christians alike—are alive and well, experiencing a



joy, peace, and "eternal weight of glory far beyond all comparison" (2 Cor. 4:17 NET). We will meet them again.

Our Pastor to Children, Elaine Pendergrass, has a wonderful resource for parents who wish to raise their children as Christians (<u>www.elainependergrass.com</u>). I've asked her if I could include a recent composition she posted and she agreed. I think you'll find it insightful.

Children Grieve Too: A Resource for Parents By Elaine W. Pendergrass

Just over a week ago, the First Christian Church family lost one of its youngest: sweet baby Courage Stude (son of Crystal and Beau, brother of Faith and Hope) is now in the arms of Jesus. What a difficult situation, which causes unbelievable grief.

Since many knew and loved this sweet four-month-old, and so many who knew him were part of our FCC Kids ministry, I'd like to offer some tips about how to help our children (and their

grown-ups) understand the tragedy of death and its implications.

There's a book I've recommended to parents entitled <u>Helping Children Grieve: When Someone They Love Dies (Revised</u> <u>Edition</u>) by Theresa M. Huntley. It explores how children typically understand death, based on their age, descriptions of the grieving process, and more. It's important to understand that children grieve unlike adults. That is normal and okay. Children grieve in stages-as adults do-and everyone grieves at a different pace. Here are some thinks I suggest:

- 1. Phrases to Avoid:
 - a. **"He/she was sick":** Be aware that children pick up on what we say. If we say that someone was sick and then that person dies, they may become fearful of death when they get a cold or the flu. It's important to emphasize that people only die when the sickness is very bad and when their bodies are too weak to work anymore.
 - b. "He/she went to sleep": If we describe death as going to sleep, children may become fearful of going to sleep.
 - c. **"He/she is an angel":** Although movies depict this, there is no evidence that people become angels when they die. Christianity does not teach that people become angels when they die.

2. Words to Use: It is okay and important to use the words *die* and *death* when someone dies. Many times people are hesitant to use these words and instead use phrases like "passed away." This can be confusing for children. Children understand in concrete terms first, then in abstract terms.

3. Life After Death: Each person is made of two parts, a soul and a body. Death is when a soul leaves its body. Death can happen to both young and old people. There is no promise that everyone will live a long life. The soul, the part that thinks and feels, continues to live. Because of Jesus's death, ministry on earth, and resurrection, we can be sure that each disciple's soul will be with Jesus forever when his/her body dies. Although our bodies die (as Jesus's did), we will one day get a brand new body, which has no need for food, won't get sick, and will never die.

4. **Breaking the News:** To tell a child that someone died, it is best to be straightforward. Here's an example of what to say: "The baby has died. We won't be able to see him on earth anymore, and this is so sad. We're really going to miss him. When our bodies die, our soul (the part us that thinks and feels) goes to Heaven to be with Jesus. One day, probably a long time from now, we'll be with Jesus too, and we'll get to see the baby again because the baby is alive and well with Jesus."

5. Is this Normal?: After learning of a death, children may cry, or say they are sad. They may have questions, or not talk about what has been learned. They may continue to play as if nothing has changed. Children may not *seem* sad or affected by a death for some time. This is very normal. Everyone copes with death differently, yet it is common for children to carry on with normalcy. Schedules, play, and routines bring comfort to children, both in times of crisis and in everyday life. Resist the urge to expect your child to grieve as you do or attempt to evoke feelings of sadness in your child. Let your child's feeling be as they are.

6. Guided Grief: After breaking the news, ask if your child has any thoughts, feelings, or questions about what death. Feelings may not surface right away, so periodically ask questions. Children may need help finding the words they need, and you may have the words to help them grieve well.

7. Fears of Kids: When someone dies, children may fear that they or others they love will die. It's important to assure children not worry about that because God loves us, is in control, and wants the best for our lives. In addition, assure children that they will be well cared for no matter what.

8. What's the Answer?: If your child asks a question, and you don't know the answer, that's okay. Just say, "I'm not sure, but I'll do my best to find out." Then do some research, or ask a professional, to help you find the answer.

9. In Memory: It may be helpful to do something in memory of the person who died. There are many things that children can do: e.g., place a photo of the person in a prominent place, do an activity that reminds you of the person who died (plant flowers, go to a baseball game, etc.), or give a gift to a school or church in memory of the person who died. 10. Next Steps: Grief is a process. It does not stay for a week and then leave forever. Stay close to your child in this process, ask questions, allow your child to process, and assure him/her that for those who are disciples, death is not the end.

Because you give, FCC is able to provide a place for people to come who are hurting and lost, a place to learn more about God and his incredible love for us, a place where God can use people to change lives! With your gifts and time we are able to provide food through LINK and household items through the Helping Hands closet. Because you give, we can maintain a wonderful facility for children to attend preschool, for those new Christians to be baptized, for bible studies, for recovery groups to meet, for couples to get married, for families to dedicate new babies and for families to say goodbye to their loved ones who have been called home. We are so thankful, because of so many, we can continue to minister and to be a place and a people that God can use to change lives!

The Trustees continue to watch the finances of the church. Because we are not seeing the needed increase in giving, we find it necessary to make adjustments to our current budget. Beginning August 1st, both the Pastor to Children and the Pastor to Youth and College positions are going to half time. It is our hope, that our finances will improve and we will be able to move back to full time positions. Moving forward, we will continue to monitor the finances and make recommendations as necessary.

Please note the following:

- On average we need \$9,204 per Sunday to cover our budgetary needs.
- Some months have 5 Sundays, the graph will indicate those months with an increase in the budget number.
- Larger one-time gifts or early annual payments of pledges will be spread over the remaining months.
- These numbers represent what is given to the Unified Budget for our operating, missions and outreach budget. It does not include gifts for the building, capital improvements or other designated gifts.
- The July numbers are preliminary, any change should be minimal. The Trustees will meet later this month to approve the July statements.

We were about 30% behind where we needed to be for June and 38% behind for July. At this rate, on average, we will be behind roughly \$124,400 at year end. If you haven't pledged, please consider doing so. If you could consider an additional gift for 2018, it would be very much appreciated. The Trustees are keeping a close eye on the finances and will keep you further updated through the newsletter and bulletins. Monthly giving will fluctuate from month to month, some of the fluctuation is related to the timing of gifts. If someone is on vacation or misses a Sunday, their gift may fall into the next month. To avoid this, might we suggest setting up recurring payments through our online giving option. Just go to our website and click the "Give" button. We recommend the ACH option as the fees are much less, than using a credit card. If you have questions or need help, please contact Marita in the Finance Office.
